Free Tax Preparation Help Available at Lifeline, Inc. January 13, 2012

PAINESVILLE, Ohio—Did you know that you may not have to spend money to get your own money back? For the third consecutive year, free tax preparation help is available to low-income families and individuals in Lake County. Lifeline, Inc. wants to help families and individuals meet their filing obligations, find credits they may not know about and protect them from unnecessary costs.

“Many people struggle with preparing taxes,” said Carrie Dotson, Executive Director. “Low-income people really cannot afford expensive advice to get the refund they should. We want everyone to know there is an alternative.”

In particular, Dotson believes Lifeline, Inc. can help many families and individuals who may not realize they qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). The EITC is a federal income tax credit for low to moderate income working families and individuals. Congress originally approved it in 1975. Eligibility factors include how much you earned in 2010 and how many children you have.

“A lot of families are at a different place financially than they were a year ago,” Dotson said. “If they earned less in 2011 than they did in 2010, they might qualify for the credit but not be thinking about it.”

Even single adults and couples without children can qualify for the credit, although families with children receive larger credits. Earned Income and adjusted gross income (AGI) must each be less than:

- \$43,998 (\$49,078 married filing jointly) with three or more qualifying children
- \$40,964 (\$46,044 married filing jointly) with two qualifying children
- \$36,052 (\$41,132 married filing jointly) with one qualifying child
- \$13,660 (\$18,740 married filing jointly) with no qualifying children

Tax Year 2011 maximum credit:

- \$5,751 with three or more qualifying children
- \$5,112 with two qualifying children
- \$3,094 with one qualifying child
- \$464 with no qualifying children

“Millions of EITC dollars go unclaimed every year,” Dotson said. “We don’t want that to happen in our community. The low-income people of Lake County can count on Lifeline, Inc. for free tax help.”

Lifeline, Inc. uses volunteers trained and certified by the IRS through its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. VITA volunteers provide free income tax assistance to low-income, elderly and disabled people.

“Through their dedication and commitment, our volunteers are what make our program a success,” said Linda Tarach, VITA site coordinator at Lifeline. “When they walk out the door, every client knows they received the best service possible and will get the largest tax return allowed.”

Lifeline’s tax clinics proved highly successful in 2010. Through the volunteer clinics, over 160 households received assistance in preparing their tax returns and nearly \$200,000 in returns were generated.

Free tax preparation is available to residents who meet Lifeline, Inc.’s federal income guidelines. Clinics are available on a variety of dates and times by appointment only. All clinics are held at Lifeline, Inc.’s Painesville office at 54 S. State St., Suite 309. Appointments can be scheduled by calling Tarach at (440) 354-2148.
