Lifeline, Inc. Recruiting Volunteers to Assist with Income Tax Assistance Program October 20, 2010

PAINESVILLE, Ohio—Lifeline, Inc., Lake County's Community Action Agency, is currently recruiting volunteers to become trained to assist low to moderate income households with tax preparation next spring. In partnership with the IRS office in Cleveland, Lifeline and its volunteers will undergo varying levels of training, provided free of charge by the IRS.

Lifeline, Inc. will provide free tax assistance to our community beginning in January 2011 through the national Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA). The program trains volunteers to prepare simple federal and state tax returns for working families, elderly, and individuals with disabilities. Tax returns are prepared at no cost and training is free.

You can make a real difference in the lives of working families by helping them claim every tax benefit to which they are entitled. Tax payers who take advantage of this free tax assistance can save on tax preparation fees and receive fast refunds.

Anyone can volunteer. No tax accounting experience is necessary, only a desire to help others in need. Volunteers participate in a several training levels. Once certified, volunteers will be scheduled to assist with tax preparation January through April. Lifeline, Inc. will use computers to prepare and transmit tax returns. Other volunteer opportunities include volunteer greeters and screeners.
